

#### More Reptile Maps

The last LARN Newsletter Number 8 gave distribution maps for the two lizard species, generated by Mapmate. Here are the equivalent maps for the two local snakes.

The grass snake (below) is much the most common reptile in Leicestershire and Rutland. It is a wetland species, frequently found along rivers and canals. In this map, it is easy to spot the routes of the Ashby Canal, Grand Union Canal and the River Wreake, as well as a cluster of records around Rutland Water.




# Dates for the Diary

On 23 April next year, there is to be a pond wildlife event at Beacon Hill Country Park featuring amphibians (at our only site for palmate newt) and invertebrates. Again, details from Holly Hayes.

In contrast, the adder (top of the next column) now seems restricted to three populations – around Bradgate, at Launde Abbey and at Ketton Quarry.

"Snakes Alive" is still running, so keep sending reptile records in.

### Frogs and Friends


"Frogs and Friends" is an excellent new publication, subtitled "The distribution and conservation of amphibians and reptiles in Nottinghamshire". Not just an atlas, it does have maps of all the species, but also poems, cartoons, photographs and plenty of biological facts. Available at £7.50 from Wollaton Hall, it points the way for other counties.

#### **School News**

The discovery of great crested newts in a pond will not hold up the redevelopment of Castle Rock High School in Coalville, as the pond is outside the development area. Conversely, at Great Dalby Primary School, great crested newts have prevented the replacement of mobiles with a permanent building. Now, though, the school want to look after the newts by managing the pond.

### **Terrapins**

There are recent records of terrapin species both on the Ashby Canal near Sutton Cheney and at Eye Brook Reservoir. These, probably red-eared terrapins, are presumably former pets released when the Ninja Turtles craze ran its course. There are concerns about their predation on other aquatic life. If you know of any other sightings, please let me know.



#### National Recording Scheme

There are outline proposals for a national herpetofauna recording sheme, making use of local volunteers. This might be run on a cycle, with different species targeted every year. There is still much thinkng to be done about this – watch this space, you may be needed!
