Woodland Wildflowers

A series of ID guides to help you discover more of Leicestershire's wonderful wildlife

Woodlands can be a difficult place for wildflowers. The shade cast by trees makes it hard for ground plants to get sufficient light. Many woodland wildflowers therefore flower early in the year before the trees come into leaf so March to early May are good times to visit. Other woodland wildflowers grow along rides and at the woodland edge where more dappled light is available.

Bluebell - Hyacinthoides non-scripta

ID: To 30cm. Lilac-blue, drooping flower head. Flowers parallel-sided with curled petals. Cream anthers.

Where: Woods, hedges. Apr-June.

Similar: Hybrid Bluebell (flowers more bell-shaped)



Red Campion - Silene dioica

ID: To 1m. Slender. Oval leaves. Pink bulbous flowers.

Where: Woods, hedges, shady areas.

Similar: White Campion (white flowers). But beware

hybrids with pink/white flowers.



Wood Avens – Geum urbanum

ID: To 60cm. Yellow flowers. Rounded basal leaves, pointed leaflets up the stem. Spiky fruits. Sometimes called Herb Bennett.

Where: Woods, shady areas, gardens.

Similar: None.



Lords and Ladies – *Arum maculatum*

ID: Large arrow-shaped leaves appear in Feb. Strange creamy white 'flower' with dark drumstick centre. Leaves later disappear leaving just a stick of red berries.

Where: Woods, hedges, shady areas.

Similar: Italian Lords and Ladies (central spike yellow)

Lesser Celandine – *Ficaria verna*

ID: Low growing with glossy heart-shaped leaves. Yellow

flowers. Flowers February-April. **Where:** Woods, hedges, shady areas.

Similar: Buttercups.



Ground Ivy – Glechoma hederacea

ID: Low growing with heart-shaped leaves – often reddish/green. Violet/blue trumpet flowers. Mar-June

Where: Woods, hedges, shady areas. Similar: Young nettles / dead-nettles.



Wood Anenome – Anemone nemorosa

ID: Low growing. Deeply-lobed leaves. White (pink-

tinted) flowers. March-May. **Where:** Older woodlands.

Similar: Wood-sorrel (clover leaves).



Honeysuckle – *Lonycera polyclemenum*

ID: Robust climber to 6m. Pink-yellow flowers are

fragrant. Berries green turning red. **Where:** Woods, hedges, shady areas.

Similar: None.



Herb Robert – *Geranium robertianum*

ID: Feathery leaves, often with a red flush. Hairy. Pink flowers with 5 petals. Seedhead hairy with a long beak.

Where: Woods, hedges, shady areas.

Similar: None.



<u>Dog's Mercury – Mercurialis perennis</u>

ID: To 30cm. Strap leaves. Tiny yellow flowers. Can carpet the woodland floor as the year progresses.

Where: Older woodlands. Hedges.

Similar: Enchanter's Nightshade (tiny white flowers)
