FIRST EVER FORMAL MEETING OF THE SOCIETY

This historic occasion took place on September 5th 1988 at New Walk Museum, Leicester following the meeting at the University on 8th June which discussed the setting up of the Society.

The first half of the meeting was very much the business section concerning the adoption of the constitution, the setting of subscription rates and the election of officers. After coffee, members appetite for some real entomology was at last satisfied with an interesting array of exhibits and slides.

Hawk moths

First to kick off was Derek Lott who, on behalf of the Leicestershire Museums Service, exhibited a drawer from their collections showing freeze-dried specimens of all the life cycle stages of British hawk moths. He also showed a collection of insects from Donington Park, which this year has been shown by survey to be a nationally important site for ancient woodland invertebrates associated with dead wood. Finally, he exhibited a specimen of *Hadrognathus longipalpis* a small staphylinid beetle, the first British record of

which came from Cumbria last year.

Leaf miners

Next Nona Finch exhibited an extensive collection of leaf mines made by micro-moths. These can best be identified by and recorded from their feeding signs. The specimens were remarkably well preserved and formed a fine and original reference collection.

Something different!

John Gladman followed on with a couple of slides of the south European Ascalaphidae. These are large striking insects looking somewhat like dragonflies although they are, in fact, of the order Neuroptera and are related to lacewings.

John Bullock brought along a fine and amusing old print entitled "The Passaliden Club" which depicted a group of beetles belonging to the family Passalidae at leisure in their gentleman's club!

ISR work

Finally the meeting was treated to a foretaste of the photographic skills of NCC's Stuart Ball. Stuart showed slides to illustrate the work being carried out by the NCC staff involved in the Invertebrate Site Register for insect conservation in Britain. Many mouths must have been watering at shots of some of the top entomological sites in the country. I suspect that some of the superb close-up shots of insects will linger long in the memory. The high standard of insect photography in these slides augurs well for Stuart's talk scheduled for April. Let's hope that he divulges some of the techniques that he has employed in taking such splendid photographs.

Indoor meetings

It is planned to have an exhibitions section at the beginning of each indoors meeting. Exhibitors are welcome to use Museum equipment e.g. microscopes, where available and should contact Derek Lott on Leicester 554100 ext 3031 in normal working hours if they wish to borrow equipment.

In any case, it is to be hoped that members will, from time to time, take the opportunity to exhibit their prize capture, or anything else of interest, as this will provide an occasion for all members to make a contribution to the exchange of information in a pleasant and informal atmosphere.

ODONATA RECORDING

Progress with Odonata data - Leicestershire dragonflies on computer.

The publication of a British dragonfly atlas is currently being eagerly awaited by entomologists across the British Isles. This atlas is being produced by the Biological Records Centre at Monks Wood in conjunction with the British Dragonfly Society. It also includes damselflies.

Local records are well represented, partly because Helen Ikin has sorted them out and organised all the museum records using the museum computer. One of the fruits of this labour was the transfer of these records to BRC "at the flick of a switch". Other Leicestershire records were sent via local natural history societies and directly from individual recorders.

Interesting trends

To date the museum has 1,632 records of Odonata (dragonflies and damselflies) in a computerised data bank. Of these, 508 were published in 1980 by H. Mendel

(Leicestershire dragonflies - Trans. Leics. Lit. Phil. Soc., 71, 29-53). The records show some interesting trends in the populations of some of our species.

Even when account is taken of the increase in recording in recent years, some of our species seem to be increasing in numbers.

These species include *Lestes sponsa* (emerald damselfly), *Aeshna mixta* (migrant hawker), *Libellula depressa* (broad-bordered chaser) and, the newest addition to our fauna, the black-tailed skimmer (*Orthetrum cancellatum*). All of these have increased

from very low or non-existent breeding populations. Changes of status of *Sympetrum sanguineum* (ruddy darter) require careful scrutiny because it may have been confused with the common darter (*Sympetrum striolatum*). Other locally rare species seem to be decreasing, especially the white-legged damselfly (*Platycnemis pennipes*), the emperor dragonfly (*Anax imperator*) and the four-spotted chaser (*Libellula quadrimaculata*).

More records needed!

These records will be published in a forthcoming booklet but we still require more records. All records of Odonata, either new or ancient, will be gratefully received and acknowledged.

Our cover is geographically

patchy at present. Table 1 shows the additions to the county list over the last ten years based upon 10km squares. Note that squares SK62, SP79 and SP89 have no records on file at all! Note also that these figures do not include records of the Loughborough Naturalists' Club.

In addition, there are some mysteries to be resolved. Does *Cordulegaster boltonii* (golden-ringed dragonfly) breed in the Whitwick area? There have been some convincing descriptions of yellow and black ringed dragonflies from this district. What is the status of the black darter (*Sympetrum danae*) at Charnwood Lodge? We are still waiting for the first properly authenticated record of the southern hawker (*Aeshna juncea*).
